We understand that finding affordable housing in this area is very difficult. Searching for housing, facing eviction, living in a car, in a shelter, or on the streets makes life even more complicated. The Good Samaritan housing team created this Housing Search Packet to give you some tangible leads toward finding solutions to your housing crisis. We believe that you can!

Please understand that we do not have programs that fit everyone's needs, but we assess the needs of those who contact us and refer them to appropriate housing resources. Good Samaritan is not an emergency shelter, and emergency shelters are the only places in Ottawa County where you can find emergency housing services. As the Housing Assessment and Resource Agency (HARA) for Ottawa County, we connect people who are, by definition, homeless or at imminent risk of homelessness to the most appropriate housing resource in the community. We also complete assessments, provide case management services, and offer rental assistance programs.

Ottawa County Housing Services

Housing Choice Voucher Program (HCV)-Formerly Known as Section 8

When the HCV waiting list is open, Good Samaritan completes the assessments to place qualified Ottawa County households onto the HCV waiting list. Due to budget constraints, currently all Michigan HCV waiting lists are closed. We do not know when the HCV waiting list will open.

Those who have a HCV are provided long-term financial rental assistance. HCV holders pay 30% of their income toward rent and the rest is subsidized as long as they continue to meet qualifications.

Although the HCV waiting list is closed in Michigan, households can apply for subsidized and reduced rent units listed on pages 15 through 17 of this Housing Search Packet by calling their offices to ask for the application process.

Short-term Housing Assistance and Resource Programs

These programs are only available for Ottawa County residents and are for those who are not currently receiving another rental subsidy. All rental units must pass an inspection and fit fair market rent guidelines.

Rapid Re-Housing:

A program where homeless individuals and families may receive security deposit, short term rental assistance, and case management services to help them towards the goal of housing stability.

Eviction Prevention:

A rental-assistance and case managment services to help individuals and families who have received a court summons, and who are at-risk of homelessness due to eviction. Rental arrangements cannot exceed 3 months, and landlord must be willing to participate in program.

Emergency Shelters

Shelters are the only emergency housing services in this area. They MAY be full.

Gateway Mission Shelters

Gateway Mission provides immediate shelter. Call to set an appointment. Some requirements such as sobriety and medical restrictions may apply. The shelter may provide other programs

Housing Search Tips

What to Consider

What can you afford?

Generally, a landlord will expect a tenant's income to be 3x the monthly rent amount. For example to qualify for a unit that rents at \$1,200 a month, you would need to have \$3,600 in monthly income.

Here's how to calculate your affordable	rent target:	
Total Monthly Income $x .33 = Affordabl$	e Rent Target	
My monthly income: \$	_ x 0.33=	_(max. rent)

Where do you need to live?

Consider the places you frequently go. Will you need access to a bus stop? How far away is work, childcare, the grocery store, and school? You may have to make trade-offs but it's helpful to think about these things ahead of time.

Activate your personal network!

It doesn't hurt to tell everyone that you are looking for housing. You may be suprised by connections that other people have!

Staying safe while searching for housing online.

Use the internet with caution. It's a great way to find available housing, but some listings may be scams. Beware of listings that do not provide contact information.

Never give out personal information or exchange money before you've seen the inside of a unit and meet the landlord.

Never give financial information over the internet. Always be sure to meet potential landlords in person.

Questions to Ask Landlords

- 1. How much is the rent?
- 2. When and how often is rent due?
- 3. How much is the security deposit?
- 4. Do you have any move-in specials?
- 5. What is required to move into the unit?
- 6. Are utilities included in the rent?
 - a. If utilities are not included, how much do they run each month (winter and summer)?
- 7. Is there access to laundry facilities (washer/dryer)?
- 8. How is trash removal handled?
- 9. What lawn care activities are the tenant's responsibility (snow shoveling, mowing, etc.)?
- 10. What is the smoking policy?
- 11. What is the pet policy?
- 12. Is the unit on the first floor or second?
- 13. What other things would you want to ask?

Applications

Most housing providers require a non-refundable application fee, generally ranging from \$25-\$50. (Subsidized complexes do not charge an application fee.) If you have reasons, you may get denied (such as poor credit or criminal history), it may be important to ask landlord if there are any restrictions or requirements before applying. If you do apply and get denied, look to the next section for information on your rights and the appeal process.

Security Deposits

The Law states that a security deposit shall not exceed 1.5 times the monthly rent (MCL 554.602). Https://legislature.mi.gov/Publications/tenantlandlord.pdf

Example: If a landlord charges \$1200 per month for a rental property, the maximum the landlord may collect as a security deposit is \$1,800. (\$1,200 x 1.5=\$1,800)

Housing providers generally require payment before move-in. Utility companies may also require security deposits before they provide gas/electricity/water.

Know Your Rights

At some point during your housing search, it's possible you may encounter discrimination or exploitation. Knowing your rights can be helpful to avoid discrimination, so keep the following information in mind as you look for housing.

Housing Discrimination

The below information has been adapted from the Fair Housing Center of West Michigan, fhcwm.org

The Fair Housing Act and other laws outlaw housing discrimination based on:

- Race
- Religion
- Family Status
- Disability

- Marital Status
- Sex
- Age
- National Origin

How do I know if I am being discriminated against? Some signs are:

- Filling out an application and not hearing back for a long time or at all.
- Only being shown properties in neighborhoods that are mainly composed of people of your race or familial status.
- Being told that the unit was just sold/rented, even though it still has "for sale" or "available" sign.
- You are told that the neighborhood "isn't right for you," is unsafe, or that you will be unwanted there.
- Being restricted to a certain floor or area of a complex.
- Being charged extra fees or higher rent than other people there.
- The terms, conditions, or availability of a unit change between a phone call with the landlord and an in-person visit.

Appeals

Most people that apply for housing get denied at some point. In fact, it is common to get denied multiple times along to the way to finding housing. If your application for housing is denied, be sure to keep your denial paperwork and ask the landlord/property manager if they have an appeal process for applicants that get denied. Your denial paperwork may also describe the appeal process. An appeal gives you the opportunity to explain your situation to the property owners to see if they would make an exception.
